

Migration Fuels Largest New Hampshire Population Gain in a Decade

Kenneth M. Johnson (Carsey School of Public Policy, University of New Hampshire) recently released a data snapshot demonstrating recent population growth in New Hampshire. Between July 2016 and July 2017, New Hampshire population grew by 7,800 residents, the largest growth experienced since 2005 and 60 percent greater than the previous year. Nearly all of this growth can be contributed to in-migration from other states and nations, a notable change from the negative in-migration experienced earlier in the decade. Warner River Nomination Update

The multi-year effort to designate the Warner River to the State's Rivers Management and Protection Program is in the homestretch. During late 2016 and early 2017, the nominating committee was hard at work meeting with Boards of Selectmen and holding public information session in Bradford, Warner, Sutton, Webster, and Hopkinton. These information sessions were in preparation for a public hearing hosted by New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services (NH DES) and the Rivers Management Advisory Committee on July 11th, 2017. Riverfront landowners were informed of the hearing via first class mail and this garnered an impressive turn out. Following the public hearing, NH DES accepted the nomination of the Warner River and filed a Legislative Service Request with the legislature. A hearing on the bill, SB 445, before the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee took place on January 16th, 2018 and was voted ought to pass and will be heard in the full Senate before crossing over to the House Resources, Recreation and Development Committee.
